A recent Wall Street Journal/NBC News poll, revealed 86% of those surveyed say they think HMOs and other managed care plans are more concerned with holding down costs than with providing quality care. Just how has the HMO market been affected by this attitude?

Treatment at the Hands of the System

26% Switched from traditional health insurance to HMO in past five years

26% Doctor often too rushed to see me

18% Doctor's office gatekeeper kept me from doctor

Denied doctor-recommended treatment by insurance company or health plan
